The site contains links to websites, lessons and educational resources across a range of subjects including English, Health and Physical Education, Humanities and Social Sciences, Languages, Mathematics, Religious Education, Science, Technologies and The Arts. Over the coming weeks, teachers will be encouraged to contribute to the hundreds of resources already on the site.

The website also offers resources on prayer, connecting with your Catholic community, tips for maintaining health and wellbeing, supporting learning diversity and ensuring students are safe.

Resources on the website are organised by year level bands:

- Prior to School
- Reception to Year 2
- Year 3 to Year 6
- Year 7 to Year 10

• Year 11 and Year 12.

Each year level band includes resources across the eight Australian Curriculum learning domains

and Crossways Religious Education.

Teachers can use the resources to create learning experiences for their online classroom. They

can adapt the resources to meet the needs of their students and their particular school context.

To further support teachers, the website also includes resources for designing online lessons,

safety protocols and technology support for video conferencing.

"Importantly, for parents and carers, the website offers information about setting up a learning

environment at home, creating routines, connecting with school and Catholic identity, and

maintaining student health and wellbeing", says John.
