Signs of ill-health/ injury/ abnormal behaviour etc	The ewe was under the care of the school veterinarian as she showed signs of hypocalcaemia and pregnancy toxaemia. This is believed to be linked to a management error in the feeding of the pregnant ewes. Symptoms included weakness in legs, in-appetent, neurological signs and scours. The ewe was receiving 'palliative' supportive care in an attempt to prolong her life to allow the lambs she was carrying to reach full term.				
Unusual/ unexpected environmental conditions	Environmental conditions were not a major contributing factor.				
Action taken — If a veterinarian was consulted provide details: name of veterinary practitioner, date and nature of consultation and outcome of consultation. Attach relevant reports.	The ewes had already been assessed a week earlier and was receiving specialised care under the direction of the school veterinarian. However her condition deteriorated rapidly, and the decision was made early on the morning of the 19 th to euthanize in order to ensure best welfare. Upon assessing the size of the unborn lambs, the decision was made to attempt a delivery via caesarean of the ewe, which was then euthanized. Both lambs were born alive however despite CPR, they were believed to be too premature and both lambs died within half an hour of their delivery.				
Probable cause of illness, injury, death or unexpected incident	The ewe was euthanized as a direct result of a deteriorating condition linked to hypocalcaemia and pregnancy toxaemia. The lambs died as a result of being delivered prematurely.				
Action to prevent future occurrence	Management of feed rations has been readjusted to ensure no errors are made in the future. Continuing high levels of observation and checking of ewes and lambs should continue to reduce the risk of potential adverse events, and allow for early identification and appropriate action to be taken.
