ALLIANCE FOR THE FUTURE

New developments from Catholic Education South Australia are supporting every student from Reception to graduation

ith a focus on enabling every child to learn and thrive, Catholic Education South Australia (CESA) is expanding its resources, both within and without school walls.

In the outside space, CESA is continuing to grow, with two new

schools set to open before the end of the decade (see page 4) and new strategies in place for regional communities (page 5).

Within schools, CESA released an independent review of its policies, programs and support arrangements for students with disability in March 2020 to learn what it is doing well,

what it should do less of and what it should do better. Since then, much has changed – including a key focus on making use of allied health services to better support students and staff. "The allied health focus is to acknowledge that many young people in schools now do receive allied health support," CESA

executive director Dr Neil McGoran says. "When they do, that's very much in a therapeutic and medical model, working one-on-one with the student, giving advice to family, to the student and the teacher.

"Our next iteration is how that allied health provision – occupational therapists, speech pathologists, psychologists to name a few – can work most productively with staff, building their capacity and ensuring that every adult working with the child is working in concert on getting the best learning outcomes. Because fundamentally, as schools, our role is to ensure that every child is learning and that learning is improving.

"We're going to more formally launch that in 2025 but we've been doing a lot of groundwork, listening to students, staff and families, acknowledging what's working and what are the areas of improvement."

Taking its lead from the recent Royal Commission into Early Childhood Education and Care, CESA is looking to expand its number of long day care centres strategically co-located with Catholic schools. "We're also planning to increase our sessional preschools. particularly in regional and low socioeconomic areas, which are probably not the places commercial operators are going to go but where Catholic education should be," Dr McGoran says. "We want to ensure we engage with children as young as we can in their learning. With good teaching and proper integrated intervention, we can wrap support around children and their families, ensuring the early years are successful, their transition into schooling is successful; and, ultimately they graduate at the end of Year 12 with their SACE qualification but also with a real passion and knowledge to make a difference in the world.'

CESA has also partnered with the Department for Child Protection to ensure any child who is under the guardianship of the chief executive, under care or in foster care can access free education at a Catholic school for the duration of their studies.

"We started with 100 and now have more than 500 under that scheme now," Dr McGoran says. "Every day I approve another scholarship.

"For us as Catholic educators, it's what we do, offering preferential options for those who are marginalised, perhaps vulnerable. In our minds, it's 'If you want to come to a Catholic school, you can, there's no barrier.' Let's make it work as best we can."

BUILDING ON ARICH LEGACY

Almost two centuries since its establishment in South Australia, Catholic education continues to grow

lot has changed in the 180 years since Catholic education was established in South Australia but one thing remains the same – the original vision. That vision, outlined in 1844 by Bishop Francis Murphy, was to enable every child across the state to have access to high-quality Catholic education.

Today, that legacy continues. South Australia is now home to 101 Catholic schools, with more than 9000 members of staff caring for more than 53,000 students.

And the growth continues. Catholic Education South Australia



(CESA) recently announced the development of two new schools in the state, one in Strathalbyn and the other at Riverlea Park in Adelaide's north.

"It's not the first time Catholic education has been in Strathalbyn,"

CESA executive director Dr Neil McGoran says, referring to St Joseph's Catholic School, which was established in the town in the 1880s.

But the new school will be very different from the old. A \$30m development in partnership with the Hickinbotham Group, the 8ha campus – set to open in 2029 – will include contemporary learning spaces, sports facilities and an oval.

Built to support existing families and new home buyers in the fastgrowing region, the primary school will be a campus of St Francis de Sales College catering for Reception to Year 6, with a possible expansion to Year 9 depending on demand.

"We have been noticing the changes in some towns – in Mt Barker, especially, which is growing exponentially, so we decided this was

a good place to open up another campus," Dr McGoran says.

"We think it would be a two-stream primary school to start with, with more than 300 students, along with maybe 130 places in the early years centre. We'd like to be able to provide a great school for young people in Strathalbyn who can then move to Mount Barker for their senior secondary school."

Due to open in 2027, the school at Riverlea Park will become a vital part of the new community being established in the developing area.

"We've been watching the north growth very closely over the past few years, and it reminds us of the 1950s and '60s, when Elizabeth and its surrounds grew and we were able to establish Catholic schools in there," Dr McGoran says. "Now you get this second generation of growth in the north, so we're putting ourselves in among those families to give them a choice of schooling."

The school will initially launch as an early learning centre, growing to include Reception to Year 6 and eventually Reception to Year 12.

"The past few years have been tremendous as we've been able to build on a rich legacy," Dr McGoran says. "We always try to be better in every sense: How we support learning more positively, teach more effectively, build better relationships and are a reflection of church and schools. It's also how we expand our horizons – being there as a symbol of the Catholic Church but also as a great facility to educate young people and be part of the community."

PUTTING CATHOLIC EDUCATION ON THE MAP

hether families call Brighton or Barmera home, Catholic Education South Australia (CESA) is focused on ensuring every child in the state has access to high-quality Catholic education, regardless of their location.

CESA's Regional and Remote Education Strategy aims to enhance outcomes and opportunities for learning relating to faith, excellence, access and growth in regional and remote Catholic schools. Currently, more than 6000 remote and regional students attend 19 Catholic schools in South Australia, guided by more than 1200 members of staff.

'The strategy is looking to support staff to be capable, confident leaders of faith and education," says Nichii Mardon, Diocesan Director Catholic Education, Diocese of Port Pirie. "It's about ensuring high-quality, equitable, targeted supports for student learning and wellbeing, access to curriculum opportunities that cater for a diverse range of capabilities and aspirations of children and young people in our schools, and supporting staff through accessible, high-quality staff formation and professional learning that takes account of the local community."

The importance of community is a driving factor of the new Regional and Remote Education Strategy. "Community is such a strong feature of regionality," Ms Mardon says. "A school is such an integral part of the local community, and our Catholic schools are a family of communities."

The strategy is also helping to build new communities and connections between regional and metropolitan schools across the state. "We have a large college in metropolitan Adelaide that is providing multimodal delivery of curriculum to senior secondary in one of our regional schools, along with local support," Ms Mardon says.

"Ît's providing regional students access to high-quality, specialist

education and giving their metropolitan-based teachers a connection to students in a larger cohort than they might normally experience. We're all on the journey together and supporting each other in these efforts. There's some exciting work being done."

Regional boarding houses are also creating strong communities while helping students overcome geographical challenges to access Catholic education. "We have two boarding houses in regional areas, one in Port Lincoln and one in Port Pirie," Ms Mardon says. "Those communities are able to offer opportunities for families to access Catholic education if they live

remotely from those towns, and provide a home-away-from-home environment for students that includes pastoral and wellbeing support.

"The boarding schools are within a vicinity that allows students to return to their home towns for weekends, where they can be with their families, connect with their local communities and engage in the activities they enjoy doing."

As CESA continues to develop and refine its strategy to further enhance learning, wellbeing and safe outcomes for students, the benefits are already being seen in regional schools. "We are removing barriers and overcoming challenges relating

to access, further improving the quality of education and leveraging the many advantages of living and learning in regional South Australia," Ms Mardon says. "There are some key strategic foci at the moment which are providing opportunities and enhancing growth for staff and students across metropolitan and regional schools.

"The overall vision is to ensure every child in every classroom in every school has access to highquality education. That's what families are signing up for, and it is the learning entitlement of every child.

"We have strong partnerships that help us to achieve this – we have excellent leaders, teachers, staff and supportive families who work together to enhance the lives and learning of children in our schools.

"Every young person who has experience in a Catholic regional school will leave that community with a sense of hope, a vision to pursue whatever their dreams might be and to work to make the world a better place."

A BRIGHT FUTURE

An investment in expert teachers is reaping rich rewards at this western suburbs school

ur Lady Queen of Peace School principal Lee Abela knows the secret to educational excellence – investing in today, tomorrow and the future.

"Our teachers are experts in their fields," Mr Abela says. "Andrew, our music teacher, is a musician, a composer and part of the Unley Concert Band. Suzanne, our art teacher, is an artist with extensive expertise in sculpting and mosaics, including publicly-installed art works in Adelaide and the Barossa Valley."

Last year the students presented the school's first whole-school art exhibition at Woodville Civic Library for SALA during August, and will be doing the same again this month.

In the digital space, students are engaging with a range of tools including Maker's Empire and LEGO robotics to participate in STEM-

based activities, providing them with the skills to succeed in the jobs of tomorrow. "We have also been fortunate to be a part of a project with the Adelaide University called Inspiring Women in STEM facilitated by WISTEMS - the university's Women in STEM Society," Mr Abela says. "Years 4 and 5 female students go to the university once a term for a STEM immersion program. To step forward at such a young age, go into the labs and get a real sense of a hands-on approach, inquiry, discovery and solution-orientated thinking is wonderful."

A revamped produce garden and dedicated food technology space offer students the opportunity to learn about food from "garden to plate" – from gardening, planting and growing to cooking and eating.

During this year's Harmony Week, local families joined students in

cultural cooking at the school for Passata Day, with 260kg of tomatoes turned into 240 bottles of sauce. Every student was involved, whether washing, chopping, cooking the sauce, or filling or capping the bottles.

"It was like we turned into a little village in Italy on that day," Mr Abela says. "The buzz, the energy, the smiles – words can't describe how amazing it really was."

Whether cooking, painting, playing music or exploring the world of STEM, Our Lady Queen of Peace School offers a commitment to educational excellence that is reaping rewards for students both today and into the future.



KEY TO TRACKING LEARNING

New practices introduced by Catholic Education South Australia (CESA) are supporting an ongoing commitment to provide excellence in learning, teaching and student outcomes.

A designated leader of learning, supported by a system coach, has been appointed to every Catholic school to help identify and drive each school's improvement priorities based on student learning data.

"The role of the system coach is to work closely with the school quality and performance team, and build the capacity of the leader of learning to lead staff at the school level to implement improvement strategies," Kimberley Shean, CESA manager, school and system improvement, says. "Through the use of a range of data sets, schools are supported to understand and enhance student learning through the development of data-informed school improvement plans."

Improving literacy and numeracy outcomes, through an evidence-based approach, is a key priority.

"Schools use the data from ongoing assessments to understand the learning progress of all students, at all times," Ms Shean says. "They can then tailor the learning to meet the individual learning needs of each student."

As well as building the data literacy of teachers, Catholic schools have engaged in professional learning from leading educational practitioner Dr Lyn Sharratt, as well as an increased focus on developing understanding of the science of learning, cognitive load theory, explicit instruction and the effective use of Rosenshine's Principles of Instruction in learning design. "Our focus is on what we call great first teaching," Ms Shean says.

The partnership between the schools and CESA is achieving a common purpose. "We've seen a positive level of engagement between schools and CESA system coaches, and what we're starting to see are the benefits of a system-wide approach to improvement in student learning – underpinned by clear direction, clear strategy and strong relationships."

PLANTING THE SEEDS OF GROWTH

Students learn Indigenous histories, cultures and traditional skills through nature

n inspiring project at St Joseph's School West Hindmarsh is bringing the oldest culture in the world into the lives of some of Australia's youngest students.

For the past two years, the Kaurna Food and Fibre project has immersed Year 5/6 students in Kaurna Miyurna culture through the exploration of endemic plant species.

Devised in collaboration with First Nations people and led by education for sustainability consultant Deidre Knight and Aboriginal education focus teacher Antoinette Di Paolo, students gained an understanding of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander histories, cultures and traditional skills.

"The idea is to stop and think about how Kaurna people lived here before any other culture and it is quite a remarkable story," Ms Knight says.

"There were no shops so they had to use their own observational skills. Their knowledge was deep and was shared over generations."

Lessons covered practical skills including species propagation and landscape design, as well as science, geography, Kaurna language, artistic expression and research as students learned to identify plants endemic to the area and develop their own school garden. "Every week we focused on something new," Mrs Di Paolo says.

"We had a word wall with the Kaurna language displayed alongside photographs. As the students worked through the program, we displayed their findings on the word wall so children not involved in the program also had an opportunity to learn."

Walking Together with Kaurna's Drew Kilner worked with the students on the Kaurna Food and Fibre project, funded by Green Adelaide and supported by the Australian Association for Environmental Education SA Chapter. "The students gained a new connection to country - walking away with a greater appreciation for what is everyone's country now," he says. "My ancestors have looked after and loved this country for 70,000 years so hopefully we are inspiring the next generation to follow in their footsteps."

Year 6 students Chiara, Maya and Abel were certainly inspired by what they learned over the two years of the project. "I thought it would be a good opportunity for me to learn about different plants, come closer to nature and enjoy the overall experience," Chiara says. "I was excited to learn about different plants – when and how to grow them. I learned a lot of new plant names like the banksia and chocolate lily and kangaroo grass."

For Maya, the project also created a new pastime she could enjoy with her family. "My whole family is into plants in general," she says. "I learned how the Kaurna people used their limited resources to provide for them and their families. I also learned about the plants, what makes them thrive and grow. I got to grow my own plants and use different techniques to see what works best."

Keen gardener Abel was also thrilled to take part.

"I learned that the Kaurna people used all types of plants for different things like medicine or food. I also learned that plants are hard to grow and need lots of attention."

Witnessing the students' development during the course of the project has been a rewarding experience for Ms Knight. "For the students to watch those plants grow—the power of a seed as an idea, that's very powerful, particularly in today's world where children might not be feeling empowered to know, 'I can put that seed in there and I have faith that's going to grow.' That gives them a lot of strength to try other things."

A manual and curriculum with lesson plans developed using the students' research are available for download from the school's and Australian Association for Environmental Education SA Chapter websites and will be shared on Green Adelaide's website. "Any teacher can pick up the manual and run with it – it has everything they need to know to establish a garden similar to ours in their own school environment," Mrs Di Paolo says.

RECIPE FOR SUCCESS

Generations connect to create understanding, share stories and learn together



ary MacKillop College Year 9 students Sienna and Ashlyn are meeting a new older friend, Judy Rogers, who regales them with stories of flying from London to New York on Concorde and the time she carried the Olympic torch 500m along Addison Rd before handing it off to Gavin Wanganeen.

Across the room, Sacred Heart Year 9 student Archer is meeting 75-year-old Peter Drew face-to-face for the first time and the two can't stop chatting about their favourite subject – football.

The room is buzzing, the connections between old and young unmistakeable.

The generations have come together as part of a partnership

between Meals on Wheels (MoW) and the two South Australian Catholic schools.

Through the Rite Now! intergenerational program, MoW is connecting older participants with Year 9 students to create opportunities to share experiences and skills and learn from each other.

"We're building connections between younger and older people, opening our students to different perspectives and putting themselves in another person's shoes," Sacred Heart Rite Journey teacher Nick Vasic says.

The process begins with students filling in a questionnaire about themselves which MoW project officer Sarah Harrison then uses to find their perfect match.

"I try to find some spark which really has been the key to the program's success," she says.

Mary MacKillop College director of students and Rite Journey teacher Liz Stewart enjoys witnessing students' excitement when they receive correspondence from their match. "I'll walk into the classroom and go, 'You've got mail' and there is complete and utter silence when they read the letters," she says.

"It's lovely to be a part of that and see the smiles on their faces."

Ms Rogers was inspired to participate in the program after watching Old People's Home for Teenagers. "I feel I've got something to offer," she says. "I have travelled extensively and had a fairly interesting life. I'm looking forward to

hearing about the girls' lifestyles and ideas, which are totally different to when I was that age."

Ashlyn and Sienna's eyes light up as they listen to Ms Rogers share those life experiences.

"It's actually been a lot more comfortable meeting Judy," Ashlyn says. "I think we all thought it was going to be more awkward but it's been really easy to talk to each other."

Sienna is excited to hear more of her new friend's life journey.

"I find it very intriguing learning about her childhood and discovering the things we can still relate to as the younger generation," she says. "I feel I can learn from Judy and we can each share our experiences. We can help each other along the way if we're struggling with different things."

Mr Drew and Archer's connection came in the shape of an oval ball – and pizza. "I was a national training manager for Pizza Hut so I think that got him," Mr Drew says with a laugh. "He asked me if I owned a store and I said I wish I did."

Their mutual love of AFL is also cause for connection – and teasing.

"I was looking for someone who is fun but also likes to have a chat about things that are going on in the world," Archer says. "I put down that I like sports and Peter also likes sports – he goes for the Crows disappointingly while I go for Essendon."

On a more serious note, Archer has already learned valuable life skills from his older friend.

"Peter has experienced the real world, and I'm diving deeper into it now, going from middle school to high school next year. He has taught me how to adapt and be organised, which will help me moving forward in the program and in life as well."

STUDENTS ARE FLYING HIGH

tudents at St Joseph's School Barmera are using space technology to explore a new frontier of science in trying to find a resolution to a devastating national problem.

Last year, the school introduced Year 3 and 4 students to the Makers Empire Kids in Space project, an Australia-first program from The Andy Thomas Space Foundation that provides students with the opportunity to participate in STEM learning through engaging, space-themed thinking. Students are now embracing the space technology to devise a solution to the fruit fly infestation that plagues much of the country, including the Riverland.

The school lies in a fruit fly red zone and many of the students' families are directly affected by the ongoing issue. "We have children from families of growers whose lives

have been affected by fruit flies," principal Nanda de Winter says. "A lot of fruit comes from the Riverland. If we don't do something now, it will have a long-term impact on our region and our families."

The school's budding scientists have joined forces with the Department of Primary Industries and Regions, SA, (PIRSA) to brainstorm innovative ways to use space technology to tackle the fruit fly problem in the region.

A visit to the school by PIRSA staff was followed by a trip to a sterile fruit fly breeding site in Barmera where students got up close and personal with the insects and learned about the sterile breeding program, which involves mating sterile males with

native females to reduce females' reproduction potential and in time eradicate the species.

"It was very interesting," Ms de Winter says. "The fruit flies were put into containers and exposed to cold air so they were not very active. The children grabbed a handful of fruit flies and had them on their hands and walking on their arms."

Back in the classroom, the students have been using their thinking and problem-solving skills to help PIRSA solve the fruit fly problem using the Makers Empire computer application. "They were working in small groups to come up with a solution which they printed in 3D," Ms de Winter says. "At the end of the term, they presented their solutions

and the PIRSA people were involved in the judging – with one of the teams chosen to present their solution, on behalf of our school, in Adelaide on July 1."

The students' exposure to cutting-edge technology and educational practices is setting them up for success. "It's futures thinking – thinking outside the box," Ms de Winter says. "Sometimes students feel limited to think outside the box, fearful to make a mistake. This project pushes them to take their thinking to the next level and think beyond the norm.

"Children are excellent creative thinkers – they like to come up with some crazy ideas. This is an opportunity for them to realise that crazy ideas are actually not bad. They can lead to something great because it's those 'crazy' thinkers who save the world a little bit at a time."

THE RIGHT FACTOR

Gleeson College has an enduring spirit that sees students return as teachers



ear 12 graduation. It's a time when most teachers and staff say goodbye to students and send them out on their life's journey.

But at Gleeson College, it's not so

But at Gleeson College, it's not so much a goodbye but more of a "see you soon".

While many schools across the nation are experiencing a teacher shortage, at Gleeson College exstudents are regularly coming back through the doors to take up teaching roles on their old educational turf. One in six current teachers at the college is an old scholar, with a high proportion of Year 12 students choosing to pursue a teaching degree at university before returning to their previous school.

So what's the reason for this "Gleeson factor"? One word – relationships.

"The quality of the relationships and the experience students have here make them want to continue to be a part of it, even after they leave," principal Joe Corbo says. "I have asked past students who have come back what made them want to become a teacher and work here, and they say it's because of the great relationships they had at Gleeson.

"They want to be able to give that experience back to young people."

It's something to which Grace Napoli and Alex Mullen can attest. Mrs Napoli graduated from Gleeson College in 2004, going on to study a science degree before returning in 2009.

"I always wanted to be a radiographer but I didn't have the marks for it so I did a science degree," she says. "At the end I was thinking about what I wanted to do.

"I didn't want to be a researcher restricted to a lab – I wanted to work with people and share my love of science so I did a Bachelor of Education which was my path into secondary school education."

After a short stint at another college, Mrs Napoli made her way back home to Gleeson College, where

she currently teaches Year 8 maths, science, and faith and living. "I was overjoyed to return and be back in the community to give back," she says.

"The staff had faith in me and my ability and saw I had the potential to become a giving, committed staff member."

Ask Mrs Napoli what she recalls about her secondary education at Gleeson College and she says "a

welcoming community and a positive experience". "There was lots to do and be involved in if you were interested. It was a good way for me to flourish and build confidence. I found myself as a person and who I wanted to be – personal qualities like humility, kindness and commitment."

Mr Mullen is Gleeson College's newest old scholar teacher, graduating in 2010 and returning in 2023. In that time he completed one semester of civil engineering at UniSA before moving to North Carolina in the US to play college soccer, where he also studied a Bachelor of Science. Returning to Australia to play professional soccer with Sydney FC, he delved into physiotherapy before realising his true passion by gaining a postgraduate degree in teaching.

"The most enjoyable part for me is making an impact on children, shaping their minds the same way my teachers did for me," he says.

"There are moments I remember of my years at Gleeson that stick with me for life. Knowing that I have that opportunity to do that with students here – that's the most enjoyable part for me by a long mile."

COMING TOGETHER IN FAITH

rom little things, big things grow. For St John the Baptist School, the saying couldn't be more apt.
The school has introduced a number of changes that have brought large rewards for the local parish, building a stronger sense of community drawing inspiration from the initiative of "Being Church Together".

One step was the placement of the office of the Assistant Principal Religious Identity and Mission (APRIM) within the Parish Administration Area.

"Just that simple move has deepened the relationship between parish and school from both an operational level and community level," principal Todd LaForgia says. "Operationally it has facilitated team meetings that occur between school and parish, as well as sharing calendars, events and educational opportunities."

A strong focus on collaboration has seen one of the school's dedicated

teaching staff take on the role of sacramental co-ordinator, working closely with the APRIM.

"In the past, pastoral associates have run the sacramental program but, over the past year, giving that role to a teacher within the school provides a future pathway to religious leadership development in a Catholic school," Mr LaForgia says.

The placement of a teacher – someone students already know and trust – as sacramental co-ordinator has resulted in 28 students participating in the sacramental program this year. "Because the sacramental co-ordinator teaches some of the children, she's able to engage them in their learning around the sacramental program," Mr LaForgia says. "Parents know her on a teacher level so are comfortable being able to approach her about anything around the church."

Year 3 students Gracie and Mila, and Year 4 student Ollie, are participating in the sacramental program this year. "My brothers, my mum and I are all baptised so we wanted to know more about God and be closer to Him," Gracie says.

The parish-school relationship and the understanding of being one community has created many special moments for everyone involved. "The interaction between the staff, the administration and parishioners has also brought in many things we never had thought of," Father Denis says.

"At the recent celebration of the Saint John the Baptist feast on June 24 we had a community Mass where the children took the prayers of the faithful and were in the choir.

"Their involvement brought a refreshing and surprising dimension to our worship, exceeding parishioners' expectations. In this participation of both parish and school, the readings were shared by a parishioner, then a teacher, then the communion minister – that kind of interaction cements our unity as a community.

"We have also witnessed four extra baptisms and parishioners wanting to help in the community as a result of the parish-school relationship and the understanding that we are one community."

This was recognised at the Catholic Education Awards. "We were just looking at establishing a vision for this community but the awards are a nice recognition," Mr LaForgia says.
