St Mary MacKillop of the Cross, Australia's first Saint is an inspiration of hope to all of us.

- · 'Find happiness in making others happy.'
- 'We must teach more by example than by word.'
- · 'Never see a need without doing something about it.'
- · 'Believe in the whisperings of God to your own heart.'
- 'Whatever troubles may be before you, accept them bravely, remembering Whom you are trying to follow. Do not be afraid. Love one another, bear with one another, and let charity guide you all your life. God will reward you as only God can.'
- 'Lean more on God and less on ourselves.'
- · 'Courage, trust in God who helps you in all things.'
- · 'God will provide for the future.'
- 'Be calm and full of hope.'

Incorporate these quotes to inspire hope and light with the various suggested learning opportunities outlined below.

Opportunities to Celebrate 180 Years of Catholic Education

- Stories of Hope invite past students and staff as guest speakers to visit and speak to the students about the history and stories of their school.
- Invite old scholars and staff to a Liturgy or Assembly with a morning tea.
- Enjoy a whole school picnic at a local park or on the school oval.
- Rewind to the past: have a themed dress up day of the attire worn to school 180 years ago.



Suggested Learning Opportunities

Staff:

Decorate the front office and various areas of the school with the theme. Maybe use some fairy lights and inspirational quotes.

Enjoy a staff morning tea.

Create staff artwork around the words 'Hope' and 'Light'.

Organise an after-school walking group to enjoy our 'natural light'.

Offer guided meditation sessions around the themes of hope and light.

Motivate staff to engage in spontaneous acts of kindness, bringing positivity and hope to the community.

Form a book club for the week, focusing on literature that inspires hope and light.

Start a bulletin board for staff to post messages of hope, achievements, and positive thoughts.

Reception to Year 6:

Hopeful Stars Art - create star-shaped crafts and decorate them with symbols and words of hope.

Story Time - read stories that focus on hope and discuss how the characters stayed hopeful in challenging situations.

Hope Garden - plant 'seeds of hope' where each student plants a seed, symbolising their hopes for the future.

Jesus' Stories – read stories about Jesus' acts of love and compassion, then have students draw pictures of these stories to create a Jesus Wall.

Inspirational Art - students create artwork that represents their personal interpretation of hope and light and articulate how they show this to others in their daily lives.

Hope Journals - encourage students to write or draw their hopes and dreams for the future.

Pop Up Prayer - organise 'Pop-Up-Prayer' stations around the school with a different prayer theme, such as prayers of hope, prayers of love, prayer of being shining lights in the school community.

Buddy Program - pair students to share their hopes and support each other in achieving them.

Service Projects - organise small service projects like making cards for the elderly, our staff or parishioners.

Hope Boxes - assemble care packages for the homeless and vulnerable. Include items that provide comfort and hope, such as blankets, toiletries, and inspirational notes.

Nature Walks - organise nature walks where students reflect on the beauty of creation and the hope it inspires, discussing ways to protect and preserve the environment.

Suggested Learning Opportunities

(continued)

Years 7 to 12:

Hopeful Reflections - hold sessions where students reflect on times, they felt hopeful and how they can inspire hope in others.

Hope Lanterns – create lanterns with messages of hope and dignity. Each student can write or draw something that represents the dignity of every person and how they can bring light to others' lives.

Community Service – plan projects that bring hope to the community, such as visiting elderly or organising fundraisers for a Catholic charity.

Hopeful Hearts Wall - create a wall where students can post their hopes and read about the hopes of their peers.

Leadership and Hope Reflection Sessions - develop leadership skills of students with a focus on how to inspire hope and light in others.

Service Projects - engage in projects that address community needs and bring hope, such as supporting younger students or organising environmental initiatives.

Hope Retreats - organise retreats that focus on personal growth, faith, and how to maintain hope in challenging times.

Prayer and Meditation – incorporate regular prayer and meditation sessions to help students connect with God and reflect on their actions.

Group Discussions - facilitate discussions about historical figures who have inspired hope, like Nelson Mandela, Helen Keller or Malala Yousafzai.

Reflection Writing – students reflect on their own experiences and stories of hope and how it has shaped their lives.

Saint Hildegard Art Show

Inspired by the Patron Saint of Creativity, the Saint Hildegard Art Show is a space for students and staff to unleash their imagination to create an authentic and personal expression of faith, meaning and understanding.

St Hildegard, a radical trailblazer in her time, was an accomplished composer, artist, writer, physician, poet, mystic, and theologian. She is well regarded for the beauty in her creativity and drawings, her profound wisdom in the letters she wrote and her talent with poetic imagery.

The theme for the 2025 Saint Hildegard Art Show is 'Stories of Hope: Our Voice, Our Light' inspired by the writing in one of Saint Hildegard's letters:

"We cannot live in a world interpreted for us by others. An interpreted world is not a hope. Part of the terror is to take back our listening, to use our own voice, to see our own light." Hildegard of Bingen

This theme, whilst complementing our 2025 Catholic Education Week theme of 'Stories of Hope', encourages young artists to explore and express their personal stories and sources of hope through their unique voices and perspectives.

In embracing this theme, you may interpret it in your own school context or broader human context. You may use your school's saint/s or charism as a focus or you may use, as inspiration, the things happening in your school.

It could be a self-portrait, or something you do with friends that gives you hope. A time where you have used your voice and felt brave or a depiction of someone you look up to that gives you hope. You may also wish to use or attach a scripture quote that speaks to this or to your interpretation more specifically.

The submissions can be in any visual form, for example, a comic book strip, a collage, a story illustration or a photograph.

Instructions

Artworks may be created in any visual medium.

Artwork entries may be submitted on art paper, textured paper, canvas or a material of your choice.

Submissions will be collected through Google Forms. These submissions must include a high-quality picture of your artwork.

The categories are:

- Early years/Lower primary (Early Education to Year 3)
- Upper primary (Year 3 to Year 6)
- Lower secondary (Year 7 to Year 9)
- Upper secondary (Year 10 to Year 12)
- Staff

Submissions close on Monday, June 30.

One entry is allowed per student or staff member (for staff, as an idea this could be done as a reflective activity in a meeting).

The artwork must be an original work.

If the artwork contains an image of another person (e.g. their face) their permission should be sought in writing, explaining that the artwork will be included in an exhibition that will be viewed by other people.

For copyright purposes the artwork must not be a student or staff entrant's copy of a professional artist's work.

The artwork must be accompanied by a 150-word explanation (maximum word count) to outline how their artwork connects with the theme.

Artworks not meeting the above criteria will not be accepted.

Judging will be based on the following criteria:

- The interpretive and creative element of aesthetic quality and interest
- The technical element of expertise in the use of medium and tools
- The religious element or capacity to explore and engage with the theme from a religious point of view
